Urban Design and Civil Protest

Urban Design and Civil Protest investigates the relationship between forms of protest and civic space, focusing on events of the last half century in Buenos Aires, Beijing, Tel Aviv, Leipzig, and other cities worldwide. The exhibition examines the socio-spatial dynamic of protest as a public dialogue between citizen and regime, and identifies the civic square as a representation of the hierarchical relationship between local authorities and citizens. It looks at three themes – Voice, Boundaries, and Appropriation – as the key interrelated spatial dimensions of protest.

The exhibition was curated by Tali Hatuka, Marie Curie Research Fellow and Fulbright Fellow in the Department of Urban Studies and Planning at MIT.
